

MY POV: Student Assignment: The Color of Water

Not only will we use this text to study narrative non-fiction, but it also will connect to American History and the exploration of James Baldwin's work that many of you have begun in Greg's class. Moving forward, we will read this text at your own pace with an on-demand writing task and final discussion as your deadlines. Some of you may choose to make a schedule for yourselves, others may just prefer to read. You should use this text to help with your narrative non-fiction study (add to the wall!), and as you read consider our essential questions:

- What does personal narrative reveal about a time-period?
- What is narrative non-fiction? And
- How can we read like a writer?
- What aspects of McBride's text are models of the tools of writing?

Ways to prepare for discussion:

- Closely read for content, structure and voice
- Pull a few essential lines from the chapters you have read and be ready to discuss the quotations by adding essential questions to them. Maybe it's a connection to social studies or your own life, maybe it's just some beautiful writing, hopefully it is something we can put up on our "wall of fame" the tools of writing we notice in narrative non-fiction
- Respond to the essential questions above and prepare follow up questions
